How to Become a Drug Take-Back Site in Kansas

You can help combat the opioid epidemic by applying to participate in the Kansas Department of Health and Environment's Medical Disposal Program, registering your pharmacy to be a DEA authorized collector, and/or signing up to be a part of NCPA's Dispose My Meds™ program.

- To participate in KDHE's program, simply fill out the [application](#) and send to KDHE's Bureau of Waste Management address listed on the form.
- To register as a DEA authorized collector, you must login to their [site](#) with your DEA number and follow the steps to obtain authorization to be a collector. It's FREE!
- To participate in NCPA's Dispose My Meds™ program (must be an NCPA member), login to NCPA's [site](#) where you can then sign up for the program and order Sharps TAKEAWAY™ boxes or envelopes – at a discount to NCPA members. You can also purchase Sharps [MedSafes](#) of various sizes instead of boxes or envelopes.

Should you choose to participate, KDHE, the DEA, and NCPA all have marketing materials and resources for you and your patients to consider when participating in the program – such as what types of medications are and are not acceptable for disposal, best practices, etc.

Signing up through the DEA will also allow you to participate in their National Prescription Drug [Take Back Day](#) which occurs twice a year.
